Reflection

In today's Gospel we hear, St Matthew's account of the parable of the vineyard and the wicked tenants who refused to give up the agreed share of the harvest to the owner of the land. And like many of the Gospel parables it comes with a warning, directed originally to a specific audience. But these parables are preserved in scripture as a cautionary tale for each following generation of believers.

We may say the same of Isaiah's image of the vineyard. When we hear in the first reading the vineyard of the, "Lord of hosts, is the House of Israel and the men of Judah are his chosen plants".

The Gospel today is about God offering his chosen people, during the course of their history, many opportunities to change themselves for the better. Most of which they squander but part of their story could easily be intertwined with our story today.

The first reading also emphasizes this when, God says to his people, "What more could I have done for my people, but I have not done." So Jesus was directing this parable at the Jewish leadership of his day. These parables have a lot to teach us about our own stewardship. And as such it has many very important lessons for the church and it's leaders, lessons for all of God's people, as we have at least, all received life from God. Life is given to us in trust and like good stewards we're expected to cultivate and manage this life in such a way that it bears good fruit. Fruits that we can present to God, the owner of our lives, on the day of reckoning.

Today the vineyard parable can be fitted snugly into many of our everyday life experiences and it raises up many questions. Questions that we should be able to answer to the satisfaction of our conscience, questions like what kind of tenants are we.

Even though we might not deserve it we all get many opportunities to cooperate with the grace of God, so as good stewards let's not squander them as we've seen in today's Gospel, Where the Jewish leaders by and large rejected the opportunities that Jesus offered them.
